HARVEY MILK (1930 – 1978)

was a visionary civil and human rights leader who became one of the first openly gay elected officials in the United States.

During his college years, he penned a popular newspaper column where he began questioning issues of diversity with a reflection on the lessons learned from the recently ended World War. He served with the Navy, and later founded the Castro Village Association. This was a first in the nation uniting of predominantly LGBT businesses. He used his community from Castro Street to help back his political campaigns.

Milk's loud and unapologetic proclamation of his true self as an openly gay candidate for public office gave hope to Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgendered (LGBT) people everywhere at a time when the community was encountering widespread hostility and discrimination. He served on the Board as a San Francisco City-County Supervisor for not even one year before his assassination in 1978.
