

MARJORY STONEMAN **DOUGLAS**

(1890-1998)

was a journalist and environmentalist who helped defend the Florida Everglades.

Beginning as a young writer with the Miami Herald, Douglas became known for work in nature conservancy after her 1947 book Everglades: River of Grass. She founded the Friends of the Everglades at the age of 79.

Marjory Douglas was an avid advocate for women's right to vote and for racial equality. In 1993, she received the Presidential Medal of Freedom.
